

## Summary of changes to English Language:

This specification has been developed in line with the Regulatory Requirements provided by the DfE and OFQUAL.

The assessment of Reading and Writing must be by 100% examination – this means the only controlled assessment will be for Spoken Language.

The examinations must be un-tiered – so there cannot be a higher or foundation tier paper.

The requirement is for a total of 3 ½ hours of examinations.

Students must respond to 19th, 20th and 21st century texts in every examination series.

Texts must cover a range of genres and types.

Texts must be high-quality and challenging.

Texts must include literature and extended literary non-fiction.

Students must compare texts.

Spoken Language (formerly Speaking and Listening) will still be required but reported separately as an endorsement and given a 0% weighting.

Spoken Language (formerly Speaking and Listening) remains part of the Assessment Objectives for GCSE English Language.

50% of the total marks must be for Reading.

50% of the total marks must be for Writing.

Please also note that 20% of the total GCSE marks must be allocated to 'use of a range of vocabulary and sentence structures for clarity, purpose and effect, with accurate spelling and punctuation'.

Our English Language specification is:

- accessible and enabling for all learning abilities
- familiar in the way that we've carried forward features that are popular in our current specifications
- innovative in introducing strategies to deal with un-tiered contexts

We have addressed the regulatory requirements through:

- two distinct papers, each of similar length and demand to minimise assessment fatigue and encourage equal performance
- single AO per question
- same questions on same papers in same sequence each series
- a range of question types and strategies footprints through a paper, in effect, taking the student on an assessment journey
- exemplification of text types that will feature in live assessments
- writing tasks with a choice of stimulus materials
- assessment of technical accuracy through candidates' own writing and not a separate task
