Signs of SEN in Children (classroom)

- 1. Is easily distracted.
- 2. Generates distraction or is considered the class clown.
- 3. Engages in disruptive or aggressive behaviour.
- 4. Gets angry with themselves, often over seemingly trivial issues. May be a perfectionist and/or have demonstrably low self-esteem.
- 5. Does not enjoy school.
- 6. Becomes stressed when starting tasks or when asked to work on their own.
- 7. Is reluctant to do homework, especially unaided.
- 8. Makes little or no progress at school. (Some children may even regress).
- 9. Avoids reading or takes no pleasure from it.
- 10. Can read but reads slowly. Has good eyesight but is monosyllabic when reading aloud (or may refuse to read out loud). May struggle to scan text.
- 11. Declares they 'hate maths' when in reality 'they don't get it'.
- 12. Is disorganised late settling to work, last to finish packing-up and leaving the classroom. 'Forgets' to do homework or revise for tests.
- 13. Forgets what the task is; has trouble remembering more than two or three instructions at once.
- 14. Has spider hand-writing, presentation of work is messy and paintings indecipherable.
- 15. Is articulate but can't or won't put pen to paper.
- 16. Has an awkward pencil grip. May have difficulty remembering where to start writing and/or struggle to copy accurately from the board.
- 17. Bumps into things, is clumsy and has poor spatial awareness. May have difficulty hopping, jumping or catching a ball and will literally trip-over their own feet.
- 18. Hears but frequently mis-hears what is said. They may be able to repeat sentences verbatim but not comprehend meaning or grasp nuance.
- 19. Finds making and sustaining friendships problematic, even avoiding social contact altogether. May be shy and withdrawn and/or avoid eye-contact altogether.
- 20. Has difficulty with change. Even pleasant surprises can be upsetting.
