

A Level Sociology

What Will You Study?

- **Culture and Identity** - What does it mean to be part of a subculture? What is the difference between high and low culture? How has global culture changed our lifestyles? Who are you? Is identity socially constructed or socially caused? What is the relationship of identity to age, disability, ethnicity, gender, nationality, sexuality and social class in contemporary society?
- **Education** - Why does the government spend around £56 billion on education each year? What are you really learning at school - skills for life or social conformity? Why do girls outperform boys? What factors determine success at school?
- **Theory and Methods** – How do theories such as Marxism or Functionalism relate to the positivist and interpretivist approaches? Is Sociology a science? How does sociology affect social policy?
- **Methods in Context** – How can you apply the research methods that you have studied to investigating topics in education?
- **Media** - Does the age of new personalised media mean more consumer choice, resulting in a wide range of opinions? Or are they dominated by media conglomerates that use them for their own purposes? Has YouTube beaten TV? Should the government be able to control the film industry? Do the media shape your opinions... or are you, the audience, in control?
- **Crime and Deviance** - Why do people commit crime? Who decides what a 'crime' is? Why are most crimes committed by men? How should crime be punished? How do the media affect our perceptions of crime? Should criminology focus on lower-class crime like benefit fraud, or on higher-class crime like tax evasion which has been found to cost the state twenty times more?



When Will You Study It?

You will have **10 lessons a fortnight** over the period of two years.

The lessons will be taught in ways that will develop a number of skills that benefit student development, including: independent and group work; presentations; research projects; exam question application and analysis.

This course ensures that all students are given the opportunity to acquire the essential skills necessary for further study and successful sociological research.
