Dear Parents, Carers, Students and Staff

Weekly Bulletin #22

Thank you to parents, students, staff, and the wider community for supporting our commitment to bringing students and staff back onsite over the course of next week. It has not been easy. However, with the wonderful support of our volunteers, we have been able to plan testing and then teaching for all by Monday 15th March. Thank you!

Our approach:

We have chosen to proceed as we have done since March 2020, with caution, implementing the recommended measures and systems of controls to ensure students, staff and their families are kept safe and well, maintaining high attendance in school and maximising learning.

Our measures and systems of controls in the autumn term were possibly above what were implemented in many other schools. However, from the student, parent and staff feedback surveys, all of our stakeholders felt safe. We now want our students and staff to return to school and to feel even safer as we face new challenges, such as new Covid variants and the nation's desperation for transmission rates to fall, death rates to fall, with key roadmap dates being met, allowing us all to see family and friends, living more freely and even taking a holiday. We are committed to doing 'our bit'.

Unfortunately, some of our students and staff will not be able to return to school from March 8th as they are classed as Clinically Extremely Vulnerable (CEV) and the school setting is still regarded as unsafe for them. We also have students and staff with significant medical needs who despite advice to shield, are choosing to return to school because of their safe experience in the autumn term and the new changes we will be implementing from Monday.

For those students not being tested, normal onsite lessons will resume for you on the relevant days. There is no stigma attached to personal views on testing, if you consent then we are happy to provide and oversee the 3 onsite tests and then supply you with home testing kits.

A reminder that students will be expected to wear a face covering in any indoor space including classrooms from March 8th. 7000 government supplied face coverings have now been delivered to our school. They are medical grade, good quality, comfortable and effective. They are the same standard as worn by medical staff up and down the country. They will be available to students who are unable to provide their own, may forget or misplace and/or wish to replace their own with a more comfortable version. These will be freely available each morning at the school gates and bus bay, or from Progress Leaders.

We believe it is right and proper for some students and staff to be exempt from wearing face coverings. Using details about their medical history and present circumstances, we will be sensitive and supportive of these needs:

'Some individuals are exempt from wearing face coverings. This applies to individuals who:

• Cannot put on, wear or remove a face covering because of a physical impairment or disability, illness or mental health difficulties.

• Speak to or provide help to someone who relies on lip reading, clear sound or facial expression to communicate'.

If your child is exempt because of one or more of the reasons above, please contact your child's Progress Leader to discuss how we can support and allocate an exemption badge/lanyard. In the absence of any medical history and/or current clinical confirmation of an exemption, Mrs Betty and/or Mr Garrity will decide how best to proceed.

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Rapid Lateral Flow Testing for Households and Bubbles of School Students and Staff

On Sunday 28th February, the Department of Health and Social Care announced that households with primary school, secondary school, and college age children, including childcare and support bubbles, can test themselves twice every week at home as schools return from Monday 8th March. This also applies to the households, childcare and support bubbles of staff. These home tests will also be offered to adults working in the wider school community including bus drivers and after-school club leaders. Critical Worker Provision On Site From 8th March

Critical worker students who are in school next week should meet in the gym each morning to register until their year group starts back at school. When their year group starts back, critical worker students should register in their form rooms with their peers. For example, year 9 critical workers will register in the gym on Monday 8th March and Tuesday 9th March but will go to their form room to register on Wednesday 10th March when all of year 9 return.

Critical Worker students will access their lessons in their timetabled room(s) from before lockdown. They will have a normal PE lesson so should wear PE kit on the day of their timetabled lesson.

Extended Form Time next week

For students on site and at home, form time will be extended by 30 mins from 8th March – 15th March. This is to ensure we can share key messages, get acquainted with our form once again and focus on our Recovery Curriculum. For on-site students it will start at 08.40 and finish at 09.30 as each year group returns. For students at home awaiting return it will be 08.50 until 9.00am as formal registration and form tutors will stary on live but will issue tutees with short tasks to do such as private reading/ quizzes etc. Lesson 1 will not start until 09.30 for all students.

National Careers Week

This year's theme for our activities has been 'Careers in the Curriculum and Enterprise'. At the beginning of the week Years 7 to 10 were working on new product ideas to solve life's little problems. They were asked to record an 'Elevator Pitch' (A two-minute persuasive talk on why someone should invest in this idea) to sell their idea. Mrs Bowbanks has been busy watching these and has been bowled over by our budding entrepreneurs!

We have also had external speakers in to talk about how the learning in the curriculum is used in the world of work. On Wednesday Jules Barrett from Adventure Unlimited spoke to our Year 8 Geographers about how he has used knowledge of maps, weather and geology in his work as a mountaineering instructor and in his work in outdoor education. On Thursday Ian Smith of TGIS aviation spoke to year 9 language students about many roles in aviation and how you can access these careers. He also talked of the importance of language skills and gave some comical accounts of when he would have benefited from better language skills in his travels! Students have been set a Languages Challenge and the best entries stand to win Amazon vouchers kindly funded by TGIS.

Today we are welcoming Brell Ewart of Whitehouse Construction to speak to our maths students in year 10 about jobs in the construction and civil engineering industry and how maths is of great importance. They have a tricky task to complete based on an activity a quantity surveyor may need to complete. Whitehouse are keen to encourage students into to the world of construction. They are currently sponsoring one of our students on a degree course and are looking to sponsor another next year in the field of Civil Engineering, a fantastically generous offer, thank you!
